Longboat Key Shorebirds Walk

November 12, 2017

Seventeen (17) aficionados joined John Ginaven and me for a morning Longboat Key Shorebirds walk (Manatee Co). Under occasionally-spitting skies but comfortable temperatures, we spent 2.5 hours entirely within 1/4-mile of the Broadway Beach access (i.e. Whitney Beach) and had a right good showing with scope views of six (6) tern species, four (4) gull species, a pair of Snowy Plover, and an American Oystercatcher. The only no-shows were "open water" birds, e.g. Northern Gannet, Red-breasted Merganser, Common Loon, and Horned Grebe.

ST. MARK'S WILDLIFE REFUGE / TALL TIMBERS - APRIL 13-15, 2018

Join SAS as we explore St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge the morning of Saturday, April 14, 2018, with an experienced local guide. Lunch will be at a cafe nearby, after which we join our guide to Apalachicola NF to look for Red-cockaded Woodpecker, Bachman's Sparrow and migrating Warblers. You are free to return to St. Marks instead if you like.

At the end of the day, we will drive to Tall Timbers Research Station and Land Conservancy (about an hour drive from St Marks) where we will spend the night at their facilities (basic amenities). Limited availability, so please let us know right away if you want to stay there. It is \$35.00/per person, 2 single beds per room. There are hotels within a 20-30 minute drive.

After a continental breakfast at Tall Timbers, prepared by the trip leaders, we will go on a guided birding tour of the grounds via open wagon. There will be a banding demonstration as part of the tour. The tour will end around $1\ \mathrm{pm}$.

Included in the \$40 registration fee are both guides and Sunday breakfast.



Bird Sense by Tim Birkhead

I was hooked on this book the moment I saw the beautiful water color illustration of a Flamingo on the front cover! Yes, I am shamelessly attracted to books by their cover. And no, it doesn't always work. But I have to say this is my new best book ever, with its wonderful blend of science and fascinating readability. The author, Tim Birkhead, teaches animal behavior and the history of science at the University of Sheffield, England. He is a fellow of the Royal Society of London and the author of several books, including *The Wisdom of Birds* and *The Cambridge Encyclopedia of Ornithology*. He is a lifelong, passionate birder who started watching birds at the age of five and was lucky enough to be able to turn his passion for birds into a career as a scientist. For over forty years he has studied Common Murre colonies, spending many summers on Skomer island, off the western tip of Wales, where 40% of the world's birds breed, watching and noting this species' breeding behavior and ecology.

Birkhead describes himself as a behavioral ecologist, and his book is about how birds perceive the world. It is based on a lifetime of ornithological research and a conviction that we have consistently underestimated what goes on in a bird's head. The chapters cover each of the five senses - seeing, hearing, touch, taste, smell and a further two covering magnetic sense and emotions.

This release was essentially its first time in the wild and first time flying a distance greater than about 100 feet.

An enthusiastic group accompanied the bird and its handlers to the top of 'Mount Celery', where it was duly released. Concern followed when the young eagle flew west across the large lake visibly losing height until it finally landed in the water. It struggled several times to get airborne without success until it managed to lift itself off the water only to go down again as it flew south parallel to the bank. At that point some members of the anxiously watching group took to their cars and drove down Palmer Blvd. to the bridge, only to find the bird perched on one of the berms, west of the lake, looking none the worse for its ordeal, to the great relief of all concerned.

Let's hope that this brave soul makes it to adulthood.

Some of the fascinating things he discusses, explains and illustrates are as follows: He describes how on one occasion while observing Common Murres he noticed a murre that was incubating suddenly stand up and start to give a greeting call - even though its partner was absent. He was puzzled by this behavior until he looked out at sea and visible, as little more than a dark blob, was a murre flying towards the colony. As he watched, the bird on the cliff continued to call and then, to his utter amazement, with a whir of stalling wings, the incoming bird alighted beside it. The two birds proceeded to greet each other with evident enthusiasm. He could hardly believe that the incubating bird had apparently seen, and recognized, its partner several hundred meters away at sea.

One of the most fascinating discoveries about bird vision in recent years is how birds use their right and left eyes for different tasks. Birds, like humans, are either left or right handed or footed (parrots). Further, those birds whose eyes are placed laterally, on the side of their heads, like ducks, typically use their right eye for close-up activities like feeding, and their left eye for more distant activities, such as scanning for predators. This has huge implications for a range of bird behaviours. For example, when peregrine falcons are hunting, they home in on their prey in a wide arc, rather than a straight line, and mainly use their right eye. Male blackwinged stilts are more likely to direct courtship displays towards females seen with their left eye than with their right. Parrots consistently prefer to use one foot to grasp food or other objects.

One of the most intriguing features of owls is their extremely quiet flight; their wing beats are almost imperceptible. This means that when flying the owl does not interfere with its ability to hear its prey, which can detect a rodent moving under a foot of snow. Added to this is the owl's incredibly acute hearing and their ability to pinpoint the source of sound very accurately in both the horizontal and vertical plane. They do this through a remarkable suite of auditory adaptations which include the facial disc which funnels sound toward the ear openings. These ear openings, which are huge, are asymmetrical, to such a degree that in the Great Grey Owl, looking at the bird face on, the right ear is below the level of the eye in the seven o'clock position and the left is at two o'clock. In Barn Owls, as well as the asymmetry, one ear opening is farther forward on the head than the other. Some owls, such as the Tengmalm's has an asymmetrical skull as

well. These features help the owl to locate their prey in three dimensional space with great precision.

I have just chosen three examples, not necessarily the best, from Birkhead's fascinating book on the senses of birds, but the whole book is packed with extraordinary facts and details, and is a delightful read. In fact I was so enthralled by the book that as soon as I finished it I started to read it again from the beginning. I really can't recommend it enough. You can get it on Kindle or paperback from Amazon.
