TRIP REPORTS





T&T group at the Asa Wright Nature Centre

If six days spent at the world famous Asa Wright Centre, Trinidad, followed by four days at Blue Waters Inn, Tobago, sounds idyllic, then that's because it was! You could call it pretty much a birder's paradise. And even a must for serious, or not so serious, birders. We were lucky to have a great group of 14 who were all determined to have a good time and have fun together, as well as seeing loads of birds. Between us we clocked up 172 birds, many of them 'lifers'. The birding highlights included Cocoi Heron, Long-winged Harrier, Savanna Hawk, Aplomado Falcon, Blue-and-Yellow Macaw, Common Potoo, Green-backed, Guianan and Collared Trogon, Gray-throated Leaftosser, Bearded Bellbird, three species of manakin, Red-breasted Blackbird, Whiteheaded Marsh Tyrant and Red-billed Tropicbird. We also saw the island's only two endemics, the Piping Guan and the Trinidad Motmot.

Having said all that the two true stars of the trip were undoubtedly the Scarlet Ibis and the Oilbird. So let's pause a bit and say a bit more about both these iconic species.

First, the Scarlet Ibis. Probably most people know, and some have experienced the famous Scarlet Ibis roost at the Koroni swamp. This involves a boat trip through the mangroves. But before even boarding the boat we were treated to a great sighting of a superb male Masked Cardinal. On the trip through the mangroves we saw a Tropical Screech Owl followed shortly by a Boat-billed Heron, not to mention a Tree Boa curled up high on a branch. The boat then moored up opposite the roost site and while drinking rum punches we were treated to an amazing spectacle as first Snowy Egrets and Tricolored Herons, followed by Scarlet Ibises started coming in to the roost. Soon the tops of the trees were dotted in brilliant scarlet, looking all the world like decorated Christmas trees, while the lower parts of the trees were dotted in white as the tricolors and snowies settled at the bases. Birds kept coming and coming, in ones and twos, in small groups, in long trails and in 'v' formations until the trees were covered in scarlet. And so on until sunset. And another rum punch.

Incidentally, this species of ibis can only be found in tropical South America and islands of the Caribbean. The large quantity of shrimp and other red shellfish they feed on produces a surfeit of *astaxanthin*, a carotenoid, which is

the key component of the birds' red pigmentation, even the bill and feet being red. It is hard to describe the brilliance of the red plumage, even photographs do not do it justice, they just have to be seen to be believed.

The Oilbird was quite another story. From the Koroni swamp to Dunston Cave, a grotto located in a deep river gorge, quite a contrast. We heard their demonic shrieking long before we arrived at the cavern. The bird's local name is 'guacharos', literally 'one who cries and laments'. Another name is 'diablotin' or devil bird. Their scientific name however. Steatomis, means

MYAKKA RIVER STATE PARK - DECEMBER 5, 2017

A whopping thirty-one participants joined John Ginaven and me for the Myakka River State Park field trip on December 5, 2017. Under sparkling skies and pleasant temperatures, we spent three hours covering such hot spots as the Alligator Bridge, the Bird Walk, and the Weir Area. Bird of the Day was undoubtedly the Horned Grebe spotted on open water from the Bird Walk. This species winters in our area in small numbers but we expect them on the coast; they're almost never seen on fresh water. A quick review of eBird suggests perhaps only one previous record of Horned Grebe for the park. The full bird list, to the best of my recollection and with highlights noted, follows (61 spp).

N. LIDO BEACH & WOODS - DECEMBER 28, 2017

About eighteen aficionados joined John Ginaven and me for the North Lido Beach and Woods Walk. Under sunny skies and cool but pleasant temperatures, we spent 3.0 hours covering North Lido Beach and then finishing up the loop through the North Lido Beach woodland. We had some good sightings including Common Loon, Northern Gannet, Bald Eagle, Snowy Plover, Red Knot, and Lesser Black-backed Gull. SAS OVERNIGHT TRIPS



ST. MARK'S WILDLIFE REFUGE / TALL TIMBERS - APRIL 13-15, 2018

Join SAS as we explore St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge the morning of Saturday, April 14, 2018, with an experienced local guide. Lunch will be at a cafe nearby, after which we join our guide to Apalachicola NF to look for Red-cockaded Woodpecker, Bachman's Sparrow and migrating Warblers. You are free to return to St. Marks instead if you like.

At the end of the day, we will drive to Tall Timbers Research Station and Land Conservancy (about an hour drive from St Marks) where we will spend the night at their facilities (basic amenities). Limited availability, so please let us know right away if you want to stay there. It is \$35.00/per person, 2 single beds per room. There are hotels within a 20-30 minute drive.

After a continental breakfast at Tall Timbers, prepared by the trip leaders, we will go on a guided birding tour of the grounds via open wagon. There will be a banding demonstration as part of the tour. The tour will end around 1 pm.

Included in the \$40 registration fee are both guides and Sunday breakfast.

oilbird and refers to the fact that in the past their very fatty chicks, larger than the adult birds, were rendered down for oil which was used in cooking.

Around 200 birds roost in Dunston Cave. They are quite extraordinary in appearance, something like a nightjar to which they are related, but much larger, at 18" long larger than a Potoo, and with a wingspan of just over three feet. They have huge dark eyes; twelve long bristles sweeping down from each corner of the mouth; an enormous hawk-like bill; and perhaps most striking of all, rows of brilliant white spots decorating their entire russet plumage, like a scattering of stardust.

The Oilbird is one of just a handful of birds that relies, like many bats, on hearing the echoes of its own voice to navigate in total darkness. This nocturnal fructivore does this by emitting a steady stream of the sharpest imaginable low-frequency clicks to navigate by echo-location. It is also extraordinarily sensitive to light, the bird's huge eyes enabling them to maximise any available light, and having millions of densely packed rods, the photoreceptor cells.

To get to the cavern where the Oilbirds roost we had to descend several hundred rough-hewn, steep and slippery steps and then descend into the stream and wade in pairs into the cave. Elizabeth, our Asa Wright Centre Guide, pointed out several birds with a flashlight, and we all got great views of this extraordinary and iconic bird.

If I'd had more space I would have talked more about the brilliant Blue-andyellow Macaw, and the amazing Bellbird, whose 'bonking' territorial call was heard every day from the Asa Wright verandah, or even the incredible hummingbirds and other delights such as honeycreepers which were regular visitors at the feeding station, not to mention the awesome numbers of Redbilled Tropicbirds on Little Tobago. Alas, space does not permit. All I can say is if you haven't been to Asa Wright, then you really should put it on your bucket list. You certainly will not be disappointed.

SARASOTA AUDUBON CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT - PRELIMINARY REPORT



The 67th annual Sarasota Christmas Bird Count, part of a National Audubon program that's now been running for 118 years, took place under comfortably cool and sunny conditions on Saturday, December 30, 2017. With results from 21 different circle areas to tabulate, it's too early at the time of this writing to offer a summary, but early indications suggest a reasonably decent count for diversity (i.e. number of species) if not numbers of individuals. Four

or five normally-reliable species at Celery Fields were hard to come by this time, but on the other hand there have been multiple reports of rare wintering warblers from various parts of the circle. At least one species we missed last

count- Northern Bobwhite- will grace the list this time

Stay tuned to the February issue of the Brown Pelican for the final results.


