

VOTE FOR OUR NATURAL ENVIRONMENT AND ITS WILDLIFE

Election day throughout our nation for Congressional, state and local offices is November 6. There are also several local initiatives on the ballot, as well as an unusually large number (12) of proposed amendments to the Florida state constitution, some of them quite complicated. Mail ballots will go out this week in Sarasota County and early voting begins at several specified polling places on October 22. Predictions are that about half the ballots will be cast before the November election day.

Sarasota Audubon and National Audubon are nonprofit organizations under section 501-C-3 of the US tax code, and hence we can not endorse candidates for election, but we can endorse or oppose issues, local initiatives and amendments to the state constitution. Some other environmental organizations, such as Sierra Club and the League of Conservation Voters (LCV), have C-4 affiliates, which can and do endorse candidates, but the finances of the affiliates must be kept separate. **Therefore, the recommendations in this article are my own, not those of SAS, though most of them reflect the recommendations mentioned above and of other local environmentalists.**

Only those candidates who, in my opinion, have or are likely to have some significant environmental responsibilities or influence, and initiatives or amendments that affect our natural environment are listed. No candidates for Judge, Charter Review Board or Hospital Board (including some friends of mine) are listed, since their decisions are unlikely to be important to the environment.

FOSSIL BONES EXHIBIT

Favored Candidates:

Governor: Andrew GILLUM. League of Conservation Voters (LCV) and Sierra endorsed. Emphasizes combating climate change and pollution, opposes offshore drilling, fracking and preemption of local governments by State. Opponent Congressman DeSantis has lifetime score of 2 % on LCV environmental voting record.

US Senator: Bill NELSON (incumbent). LCV and Sierra endorsed. Has lifetime score of 95% on LCV environmental voting record. Opponent Gov. Scott has during campaign moved against red tide but during two gubernatorial terms cut environmental funds, appointed notable enemies of environment and was denounced by environmentalists.

US House of Representatives, District 16. David SHAPIRO, LCV and Sierra endorsed. Emphasizes reducing greenhouse gas emissions through clean, renewal energy, preserving environmental lands. Opponent incumbent Congressman Buchanan has lifetime score of 19 % on LCV environmental voting record.

US House of Representatives, District 17. No recommendation at present, but probably environmentalists will support whoever runs against Republican nominee, former State Senator Greg Steube, known primarily for the many pro-gun bills he has introduced in the State legislature. April Freeman won the Democratic primary but died too late to have her name removed from the ballot. I understand that gives the Democratic party the right to nominate a replacement, whose name will not be on the ballot and who is not known at the time of this writing.

Florida Attorney General. Sean SHAW. Sierra Club endorsed. Both as a member of the Governor's cabinet and as the person who controls the engagement of the state in legal issues the AG can be important to the environment.

Florida Agricultural Commissioner. Nikki FRIED. Sierra Club endorsed. Also a member of the Governor's cabinet. Important as influencing land use, especially of state land and pollution control.

Florida State Senate, District 23, Joe Gruters vs. Faith Olivia Babis. No recommendation.

Florida House of Representatives., District 72 (incumbent) Margaret GOOD. Sierra Club endorsed. A particularly strong candidate. Lists protection of our environment and prevention of severe Red Tide and algae blooms as her first objectives. She served only a couple of weeks in the last legislature after winning an upset victory to replace a legislator who resigned. An attorney with good environmental ideas and drive.

Florida House of Representatives. District 73. Liz



Have you stopped by the Nature Center to see our fossil bones exhibit?

This year we have two display cases, featuring bones from prehistoric Celery Fields inhabitants. Most of these bones come from the period, between 10,000 and 100,000 years ago, when the Celery Fields area was covered with extensive grasslands, along with some wetlands and marshes. Fossils of turtles, fish, and alligators are abundant. However, mastodons, mammoths, three-toed horses, camels, bison, and deer grazed on the grasslands. Top predator of these herbivores was the Saber-toothed tiger. Fossils of these cats have been found in our area also, so we know the Celery Fields was an area of flourishing wildlife.

In the late 1990's, when the county was converting the former agricultural fields to the present storm water management area, the Manasota Fossil Club received permission to sort through the mounds of dirt which had been excavated. One member, Elaine Dunkelberger, has graciously permitted us to exhibit some of her finds. The ponds on the north end of the Celery Fields are the deepest, so the majority of the large animal (mammoth and mastodon) bones were found there. Included in the collection are giant leg bones, teeth, tusk, pelvis, and brain cavity fossils. Many smaller bones and fragments document the presence of peccaries, horses, camels, and bison, which are also displayed for you in the cases.

And you thought the Celery Fields was just birds!

STATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS:

Of the 12 amendments to the Florida Constitution (numbered 1 through 13 excepting number 8, which was removed from the ballot by court order since it contained more than one subject), only Amendment 9 directly and primarily affects the environment. It prohibits offshore oil and gas drilling. (It also prohibits vaping in enclosed indoor workplaces, but most observers feel that strange addition was an apparently unsuccessful effort to have the courts kill the environmental benefit of the drilling prohibition by adding another subject.) We therefore join the Florida Wildlife Federation, Sierra Club and many civic organizations in recommending **VOTE YES ON AMENDMENT 9.**

While Sierra and some other groups recommend a "no" vote on some amendments that restrict funding that might be otherwise be used for environmental purposes or a "yes" vote for amendments with possible social benefit, I do not consider them sufficiently environmental for Sarasota Audubon to take a position.

COUNTY BOND REFERENDUM: Legacy Trail

Extension. VOTE YES. This is in effect a little wildlife corridor that, if extended, will extend habitat for birds and other small wildlife into the city.

COUNTY CHARTER AMENDMENTS:

Charter Review Board proposals to go to the next general election rather than to the next county-wide election. This is not very important, but it could delay the adoption of some environmental issue. **PROBABLY VOTE NO.**

Retain Siesta Beach Road as Public Right of Way. VOTE YES

Preserve County-owned parks, preserves, beach and water access and waterfront vistas. VOTE YES

Change County Commission Elections to Single-Member Districts. VOTE YES. This amendment is important. County Commissioners are now elected county-wide though they must live in their (one of five) district. They must therefore campaign expensively county-wide. Unless they are personally wealthy, they must depend on heavy contributions from developers with their PACs. This change could

"Hope is a Thing with feathers..."



Feathers - one of nature's most exquisite and versatile designs. All birds, and only birds, have them.

I'm holding a peacock feather as I write - a foot long, nearly weightless, and soft as silk. Feathers are dead. Like hair, they're made of keratin, one of nature's toughest proteins, sheer, light, and strong. My feather is durable enough to protect a bird, in this case, the peacock, fleeing through dense tangles of grass and brush. Birds get a new set of feathers every year. If damaged, they can shed them to make way for new growth. Maybe that's where mine came from. Feathers are porous, made up of tiny microscopic air gaps. These huge volumes of air inside the feather are the secret to how precisely wing feathers keep birds in the air. Feathers act as a bird's GPS system and oddly, they grow branched, like a tree.

If I haven't convinced you to nominate feathers for the 2019 "7 Wonders of the World" list, get this.

My peacock feather's gorgeous greens, brilliant blues, and loamy earth hues are the ultimate eye candy. Feathers have the most vibrant colors in the natural world, and while they're important for sexual attraction and camouflage, their beauty led to the near extinction of many species of birds. For nearly three decades, starting in the 1870's, there was an enormous global craving for feathers to adorn women's hats. Snowy egrets were killed by the thousands for their brilliant white plumes, and the long delicate trailing nuptial plumes that grow off the backs of their heads during mating season, the aigrettes. Their mass killings left the earth looking snow covered. The grass roots campaign to end this savagery led to the formation of the National Audubon Society.

Register for training For more info: 407-644-0190 Ext 118 or We use feathers to describe how light something is, e.g. "as light as a feather;" but interestingly enough, the extreme lightness of a bird's feathers is more integral to sustained flight than its muscles.

The lightness and size of the golden eagle allows it to soar higher than any other bird. To the Native Americans it's a "spirit bird," because it soars higher and can see and hunt better than any other, bridging two realms, heaven and earth. "The golden eagle is our messenger to the Creator," notes Lee Plenty Wolf, a spiritual teacher in the Oglala Lakota tribe. Its feathers were, and still are, sacred, representing the highest values of trust, bravery, and honor.

I stroke my feather. It is exquisitely soft. Feathers are the softest thing nature produces. We cram duck and goose down feathers into pillows, duvets and mattresses, because they make the warmest and lightest types of clothes and bedding we use. Amazing how something nearly weightless is one of the most effective natural insulators known to us, and we've never been able to replicate them.

The world's best-quality down is eiderdown, which comes from a wild sea duck, the common eider, whose feathers help it survive the harshness of the winter wind-whipped northern seas in the Arctic mudflats. Due to the eiderdown's rarity, superb quality, and labor-intensive gathering, an eiderdown comforter can range anywhere from \$3000 to \$20,000.

I lay my feather down and reflect on the spirit bird, soaring high, bringing messages to the Creator, its feathers inspiring greatness to a past generation.

And feathers continue to inspire:

"Hope is a thing with feathers that perches in the soul. It sings the song without the words, and never stops at all." (*Emily Dickinson*)

Feathers - birds, and only birds, have them.
