Message From: The SAS Board of Directors

Dear Sarasota Auduboners,

As we move through the summer, we still do not know how the fall is going to pan out for us.

- The church hall where we hold our monthly meetings will not be open in the foreseeable future, so that means that we have to change how we conduct general meetings;
- We are not sure yet when our activities will start up; and
- We are not sure when the nature center will open.

In spite of these uncertainties, we are forging ahead with Zooming our meetings. Karen Willey, Nature Center Manager, has been busy this summer setting up Zoom capabilities. And in late September, at our virtual board meeting, we will come to some decisions about the nature center opening, field trips, bird naturalist activities, and meetings. NATURE CENTER HAPPENINGS



Nature is Open: Even though the Nature Center is closed, unofficially the gardens remain open to visitors. We have, thankfully, had very few issues over the duration of the COVID lockdown and then the long, hot summer. As we look to September the numbers are still too high for re-opening according to the CDC health guidelines. However, the gardens are happy from all the rain and the weeds are running rampant!

Wonderful Weeders: Kudos to the small, but mighty, crew that worked periodically over the summer months to keep some semblance of order in the gardens: Linda Kitch and Marie Brooks-Deamud. And of course, Andy Schneider, who comes in more than weekly to keep the grounds clear and the building running. I live in downtown Bradenton, so am working mostly from home, although I am coming into the Nature Center more often as the time goes on... The bird feeders are empty for now, and until we get a volunteer who is willing/able to fill them daily.

Plant ID Training: If you are interested in assisting our wondrous weeders – you are invited to do so! We work physically distanced and outdoors, following CDC guidelines. CONSERVATION



MIGRATORY BIRD TREATY ACT VICTORY!

In March, the Sarasota Audubon Society urged you to help save the *Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA)*

A proposal from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in March would have taken away companies' incentives to adopt bird-friendly technologies; and would even have eliminated penalties for large bird kills from oil spills, etc.

VICTORY – In a major victory for birds, a federal judge ruled that the Migratory Bird Treaty Act DOES cover unintentional but avoidable avian deaths. On August 11 Judge Caproni wrote:

"It is not only a sin to kill a mockingbird, it is also a crime. That has been the letter of the law for the past century. But if the Department of the Interior has its way, many mockingbirds and other migratory birds that delight people and support ecosystems throughout the country will be killed without legal consequence."

STILL WORK TO BE DONE - People on both sides of the case expect the administration to appeal. We need to keep pressure on lawmakers to strengthen this law rather than carving out new loopholes for corporations. For more information:


