MOVEMENT ECOLOGY OF SNAIL KITES IN BRAZIL with Dr. Alex Jahn, Midwest Center for Birds & Biodiversity



Dr. Alex Jahn, Environmental Resilience Institute; Midwest Center for Birds and Biodiversity,

Hundreds of birds migrate in South America, yet we understand relatively little about their seasonal movements. Dr. Jahn and his colleagues used satellite transmitters to study the movement ecology of 10 Snail Kites captured in southern Brazil, tracking them over two years.

Some kites migrated 4000 km to spend the non-breeding season at the mouth of the Amazon River, whereas others exhibited nomadic movements, moving different **Indiana University**

distances and to different sites between seasons and years. The complex movements and variable migratory behavior they detected points to the need for more detailed research on the ecology and risks to survival of this poorly studied species in South America.



new nesting season is happening right now!




OPEN DAILY 9am - NOON

Spring is in the air! The Coral Bean (Erythrina herbacea) is in full glorious bloom and we are seeing ruby-throated

Hummingbirds this week in our Native Gardens. The Painted Buntings continue to grace our feeders, and a White-winged Dove has made an appearance.

It's Purple Martin nesting time! So far this year, we have a total of 108 eggs and 70 hatchlings. The earliest





Speaking of infestations, a Red Rat Snake was discovered in the Purple Martin house this week. Sadly the snake got a total of at 1 chick and 16 eggs. The snake was relocated far from the nest house. Additional protective measures may be taken. In addition to baffles, putty, and tacks; vaseline was added to the pole today. Nets will be next.



Our Local Loons are Struggling

For the first time in its history Save our Seabirds in Sarasota is performing necropsies on Common Loons. Dr. Passarelli's findings are that all of the birds were emaciated and most of them were infected with aspergillosis, a fungal infection of the respiratory system. One of the two samples she submitted for toxicology had

elevated levels of brevitoxins, which are the harmful substances produced by red tide (*Karenia brevis*). Both of the samples also had very high levels of mercury and selenium, which are harmful heavy metals that can accumulate in fish. As alarming as these findings may sound, it's important to recognize that they don't yet point to a single, definitive cause of local COLO mortality. That goal will require additional study.

Birds of the Snowy North: Winter Trip, Upper Peninsula Michigan

Went to Michigan in late February with pals Gary, Paul and Betty to do some winter Brrrrrding in northern Michigan. The most challenging thing to cope with besides temps that ranged from a low of -16^oF to a high of 21^oF, was driving snow and high winds. Hands were cold no matter what type of glove I was wearing (with hand warmers to boot). It was difficult keeping lenses on binoculars and cameras dry, since the snow was coming in sideways, and eyes were constantly tearing up from the wind.

The first two days we journeyed from Detroit all the way up to the upper peninsula, to Marquette. Our targets there were various passerines that included: Pine Grosbeaks, White-winged Crossbills(which have a very limited range in the lower 48s) Bohemian Waxwings, Hoary and Common Redpolls. Some of the access to forested areas were completely snowed in and closed off for birding. Those first two days saw over 18 inches of snow.

CLIMATE CHALLENGES Sports



Southwest Florida's subtropical climate supports individual and team outdoor sports throughout the year, including tennis, golf, track and field, cross country, baseball, football, and soccer.



Since 1966, there are 42.5 more days a year with temperatures at or above 90° F in Bradenton, Florida. Rising greenhouse gas emissions will continue to drive this warming trend.

MORE HOT DAYS





Rising temperatures combined with Florida's high humidity reduce the body's ability to cool itself through sweating, and increases risks of heat exhaustion and heatstroke. Heatstroke is a life-threatening medical emergency that requires immediate attention.

CLIMATE SOLUTIONS Sports

Conserving energy and transitioning to renewable energy sources will slow climate change, but we still need to adapt to warming already underway and prepare for more frequent high heat days.



Heatstroke is the 3rd leading cause of sudden death in teen athletes.

Tips to prevent heat-related illness

- Work up. Slowly acclimate to high temperatures over weeks during training.
- · Lighten up. Wear light colored, loose-fitting clothing.
- · Drink up. Stay hydrated with water and electrolytes.
- · Stay up. Schedule evening games in the summer.
- Wise up. Learn to recognize symptoms and how to immediately care for heat related illness.




