More to come as we finalize the permitting and move towards construction.

Saving energy, water, and other resources are key elements of sustainability. For a limited time, Sarasota County also has a way for attendees to save money to attend its annual sustainability workshop.

Discounted, "early-bird" registration remains open until Sept. 26 for the 17th Annual Sustainable Communities Workshop, a full-day workshop that showcases strategies for healthy, resilient, thriving communities.

This year's workshop—open for either in-person or online participation—will gather under an "Advancing Climate Solutions" theme, meeting 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Nov. 21 at the New College of Florida Harry Sudakoff Conference Center, 5845 General Dougher Place, Sarasota.

This popular workshop will draw together residents of all ages, business owners and employees, non-profit leaders, government officials and others to learn about environmental, economic and social aspects of sustainability. Workshop topics include carbon sequestration, regenerative agriculture, climate change, social equity, local projects, and more.

Sept. 26 marks the last day to register at the workshop's in-person \$35 "early-bird" rate, with prices rising to \$45 afterward. Virtual attendance costs \$10. Student attendees pay just \$25 for in-person or \$5 online.

# The Godwit's Long, Long Nonstop Journey

Researchers marvel at the bird's record-holding migratory flight of 7,000 or so miles from Alaska to New Zealand at this time of year. No eating or refueling along the way.

"It's not really like a marathon," said Christopher Guglielmo, an animal physiologist at Western University in London, Ontario, who studies avian endurance physiology. "It's more like a trip to the moon."

The journey of these ultra-endurance athletes is made possible by a suite of adaptations.

# BIRD OF THE MONTH Red-winged Blackbird



We see so many at the Celery Fields you may not realize that this species is declining.

Red-winged Blackbirds are sexually dimorphic, meaning males and females have very different appearances as evidenced in the photos on the left.

Nesting is a dicey game of hide-andseek in the wetlands and fields where Red-winged Blackbirds breed.




