Notes from the Nature Center, March 2024

The fun continues at the Nature Center as we head out of winter and into March. Record numbers of visitors from all over the world have made their way to Celery Fields for birding, hiking, picnicking, and learning.

Extended Hours: The Nature Center is now open extended hours through April to accommodate a large number of visitors. In addition to being open from 9 a.m. to noon every day, we also stay open until 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. That means you can sleep late on weekends, and still come visit us.

Members Meet & Greet: Our third and final Members Meet & Greet of the year is scheduled for Wednesday, March 20, from 2 to 3:30 p.m. Come to the Nature Center to enjoy snacks, conversation, and a presentation from an environmental expert on



Painted Buntings. James ("Jamie") Rotenberg is an Environmental Ecologist recently retired from the Department of Environmental Sciences at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. He uses birds as environmental indicators of habitat change and condition. Jamie's talk will focus on his work as a member of the "Eastern Painted Bunting Working Group," where Jamie and his team banded about 5,000 Painted Buntings between 2006-2012 – all with the help of hundreds of Citizen Scientists. His presentation will summarize his findings and show how Citizen Science can confirm important trends in habitat use as well as arrival and departure dates for Painted Buntings.

Beach-nesting Monitoring Workshop: On March 26 at 1:30, Audubon Florida's Holley Short will be at the Nature Center to discuss the beach-nesting monitoring program. Members of the public are encouraged to volunteer on the beaches to help protect Black Skimmers, Least Terns, and more. Come and learn how to do your part in this vital endeavor.

Holley Short of Audubon Florida will lead a presentation about the nesting shorebirds and seabirds of Sarasota County. She will also discuss the Bird Stewardship volunteer program and how you can get involved to protect our threatened beach-nesting species, such as Snowy Plovers, Black Skimmers and Least Terns.

Every summer we shut down from June through September because many of our volunteers go back up north and many visitors flee Florida's heat and humidity. Through the end of April we will be open from 9 a.m. until noon every day, plus until 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. In May, we're only open from 9 to noon, without extended weekend hours. On Thursday, February 22nd at 11:00 a.m. the volunteer Purple Martin team began their twice weekly chick checks.

Data collection times are open to the public and will continue

on Thursdays and Sundays at 11:00 a.m., weather permitting, until April 1.

On April 1 the time will change to 10:00 a.m. The time change is confusing, but necessary. We start later in the cooler months to wait for the bugs to fly and parents to catch them to feed the babies. As seasonal temperatures rise, we start earlier to avoid the volunteers swooning in the heat.


We have just upgraded our website to be ADA compliant. We are thrilled that we

Destinations on this active 13 day birding excursion, led by local guides, include Lima, Tambopata, Yucay, Machu Picchu, and the Ballestas Islands.

Highlights

- Spot some of the 400-plus species found in Machu Picchu & surrounding areas.
- Explore the Amazonian lowlands by boat and on foot to look for colorful macaws, tanagers, and the enigmatic Hoatzin.
- Discover the mist-fed ecosystem of Lomas de Lachay, home to an oasis of dwarf forest in the Peruvian desert.
- Visit Pantanos de Villa, a Ramsar Wetland of International Importance that provides critical habitat for waterfowl and migratory shorebirds.
- Travel by boat to witness the seabirds of Ballestas Islands, including the Humboldt Penguin, Peruvian Booby, Inca Tern, and the near-threatened Peruvian Diving-Petrel.

Janice Noto has always loved photography, but decided to start taking it seriously as she was getting closer to planning her first overseas trip to Italy in 2015, which is just about




the time she started her first website - **1worldphotography.com**.

BIRD BLOG: White Morph Great Blue Heron by Lou Newman

I have had the unique opportunity to observe and photograph a White Morph Great Blue Heron from both ground level and high above. Unfortunately, this bird is on private property not open to the public.

I like to say, "The most predictable thing about birds is their unpredictability." That is true in spades when it comes to this White Morph Great Blue Heron. Behavior-wise I would swear it is a female and the Dark Morph mate is the male. However, the White Morph has been seen copulating twice in the top position, once last year and once this year. Last year this pair fledged two Dark Morph (regular or "normal" looking) Great Blue Heron chicks.

Since GBHEs do not mate for life, I cannot be sure but would suspect this is the same pair that nested in this location last year. If so, it seems unlikely that the product of this mixed pairing of Dark Morph and White Morph will result in intermediate morph Wurdemann's Heron chicks. Time will tell.

(Editor's note from All About Birds: The "Wurdemann's" Heron of the Florida Keys is the product of mixed pairings between Great Blue and Great White herons. It is intermediate in size and plumage, showing a Great Blue-like body but usually with a variably whitish head and

neck).

I believe current thinking is that this is a color morph and not a subspecies of Great Blue Heron. White Morphs are not uncommon in the Florida Keys, rare elsewhere.
