The Lonesome Whippoor-will: The Untold Story of America's Most Iconic Bird, with Jared Del Rosso Monday, March 10

With their famous songs and nocturnal lives, Nightjars (like Eastern Whip-poor-wills and Common Nighthawks) are among the most iconic birds in the U.S. For centuries, they've shaped our songs, poetry and literature.

But despite their importance, nightjar numbers are declining. Most birders sense this, as it's becoming increasingly difficult to see and hear them.

Based on research for his inprogress book on Whip-poor-



wills, cultural sociologist Jared Del Rosso takes you behind the legend, lore and lives of America's nightjars.

New Aldo Leopold Benches in the Butterfly Garden

A nature journal is a lens that focuses your attention, enriches your experiences and develops your skills as a naturalist. This practice also enhances your observations, curiosity and joy.


Nature Journaling can consist of field notes, field sketches, observations, thoughts, feelings or anything else that captures your curiosity.

Sarasota Audubon is very pleased to present the joint offerings of Jean Blackburn and Steven Schaefer for our March art exhibit at the Nature Center. The couple work together on their art as well as the rehabilitation of wildlife. Steven does most of the photography; Jean is the painter.

Jean and Steven have lived on 14 acres in Old Myakka for 35 years. What was mostly open pasture is now a varied native ecosystem that provides habitat for many birds and other wildlife species. The majority of the artworks in this exhibit portray life on their property and in Myakka River State Park.

Steven Schaefer's professional career included heading the Manatee County Public Defenders office. He holds an Oceans and Environmental Law degree from the University of Oregon.

Jean Blackburn completed her MFA also from the University of Oregon. She taught fine arts there and at New College of Florida, Ringling College of Art and Design and State College of Florida, Manatee.


Thank you, Temple Emanu-El!
